2. OTTER POINT OFFICIAL COMMUNITY PLAN REVIEW

The deadline to comment on the draft recommendations of the Otter Point Official Community Plan Review Committee will be Monday, July 4. View and comment on the committee's draft recommendations either on-line or by picking-up a copy of the OCP workbook at the Rock Beach Grill (Kemp Lake Store), 7875 West Coast Road at Kemp Lake Road. Return completed copies of the workbook to either the Rock Creek Grill or the Juan de Fuca Planning Services Office 2-6868 West Coast Road, Sooke by the July 4 deadline.

HB Lanarc (the consulting company engaged to assist with the OCP review) will summarize comments received by Monday, July 4 and will be present the summary to the OCP Review Committee later in July. Following this meeting, the committee will submit its final recommendations for changes to the Otter Point OCP to Juan de Fuca Planning Services. JDF Planning Services will then begin work on a draft revision of the Otter Point OCP which will be returned to the OCP Review Committee and the Otter Point community for comment sometime in the early fall. Following this it will then go to the JDF Land Use Committee for their consideration before being referred out to local agencies and commissions for comment.

Highlights of the committee's recommendations include:

- Identification of Special Rural Areas that the community wishes to conserve as the rural heartland of Otter Point and its ecosystems.
- Giving priority to supporting healthy ecosystems by protecting the environment, groundwater, watersheds, foreshores and wildlife.
- Preserving the rural and natural character of Otter Point by limiting development, keeping larger lots, siting buildings to protect sensitive areas and avoid having similar houses on the same place on same size lots.
- Separating the the discussion of community piped water supply from land use, thereby allowing for the consideration of expanding piped water beyond the area presently served by the Kemp Lake Waterworks District.
- Developing an extensive system of multi-use trails that support recreation and link parks and bus stops.

- Transfer of development potential from one property to another to acquire public amenities such as trails, parks, community forest or farm space by allowing higher density on a property in exchange for the amenity.
- A minimum parcel size policy in different parts of Otter Point. Parcel sizes would range from 1 acre (0.4 Ha) in more settled areas to 10 acres (4 Ha) in more rural areas presently zoned as forestry, agriculture and watershed.
- Encouraging achievable alternatives to building strata (4 on 10) by making bare land strata and fee simple parcels a more attractive alternative.

Many of the points raised in the OPSRRA submission are captured in the OCP Review Committee's draft recommendations; others are not. The OPSRRA recommendations were centred around the following:

Community Issues and Pressures for Change

Various interrelated and sometimes conflicting community issues and pressures for change need to be recognized when reviewing the Official Community Plan. These include:

- The high value many Otter Point residents place on the preservation of rural green space, the natural beauty of the area, and the maintenance of a rural lifestyle with privacy and "elbow room".
- Ongoing provincial, regional and local public debate about the impacts of global climate change and the future role of non-urban areas such as Otter Point in managing greenhouse gas emissions, increasing local food security, and dealing with extreme weather events.
- Current and anticipated CRD regional planning goals of keeping regional urban growth compact and avoiding the development of urban sprawl by maintaining policies such as restricting CRD water and sewage services west of Sooke.
- Growing concern by residents about maintaining a secure water supply and the recognition that a community-wide planning process is needed to:
 - assess long-term community water supply options (including Kemp Lake water, potential CRD water, and a mix of potable well water and catch/retain residential cistern systems);
 - identify potential community water supply development costs; and
 - establish measures to manage and protect local water supplies.
- Growing recognition that science-based information and standards should be the basis for identifying and conserving the natural environment, particularly dominant sensitive ecosystems, streams, watersheds, aquifers and bodies of water.
- General awareness that long-term land use planning in Otter Point should be integrated with long-term planning for the provision and funding of fire protection, security of water supply, transportation, and other services.
- Growing recognition by Otter Point residents that governmental decisions about local environmental conservation, community services, and land use planning are made primarily by decision makers who are neither residents of Otter Point nor elected by Otter Point residents.

- Increasing interest in Otter Point in the establishment of a parks and trails network linked to trails in neighbouring Sooke and Shirley, which would support local and tourism-related outdoor recreational activities.
- Ongoing and anticipated initiatives by large commercial land developers and the construction industry to have Otter Point develop as a small-lot, high-density, low-regulation, rural "bedroom village" for the Capital Regional District.
- Growing community concern that such a "business only" development model will lead to ongoing deforestation, environmental degradation, small-lot urban sprawl, higher property taxes, and the loss of the district's rural character.

3. UPDATE: WELCOME TO SHIRLEY AND OTTER POINT SIGNS

We have now raised enough money to proceed with the construction and installation of the two *Welcome to Shirley* and two *Welcome to Otter Point* signs along Highway 14 (See the June OPSRRA newsletter for details). Donations in the form of discounts, cash, kind and services from the following sources have made it possible to pursue this community project:

4. ROUTE CHANGE PLANNED FOR SOOKE TRIATHLON?

This year's August 7 Sooke Triathlon may have a route change. Much of the annual event takes place in Otter Point beginning with a swimming start in Young's Lake at Camp Barnard. A spokesman for event organizer Western Triathlon Series replied to an OPSRRA request concerning a possible route change for this year's event. Indeed, they are considering some options that would be a variation from the traditional loop around Otter Point Road and West Coast Road. There is now the possibility of heading further out Highway 14 towards Shirley and/or Jordan River. The change is being considered in light of the extensive TSN television coverage which this year's triathlon will be receiving.

This event requires road closures and traffic delays. The event organizers are aware of the inconvenience this can cause and will be informing the community and the OPSRRA newsletter of any planned route changes in time for the August newsletter.

5. WHERE IS DEVELOPMENT PLANNED IN YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD?

June Klassen, Manager of Planning Services for the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area (JDFEA), has made it easier for people to find out what developments are being considered in their neighbourhoods. At the June JDF Land Use Committee meeting, Ms. Klassen announced that all applications for variances, development permits and subdivisions are now posted at the JDFEA website: http://www.crd.bc.ca/jdf/landuse/current_apps.htm. There are explanations of what permits are required and how to apply. There is also an explanation of why only some development permit applications (those that also require a variance) are published to neighbouring property owners.

6. JDF ELECTORAL AREA SIGNS A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH THE DISTRICT OF SOOKE

The Capital Regional District, on behalf of the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area (JDFEA), has approved a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the JDFEA and the District of Sooke. This initiative has come about, in part, as a result of OPSRRA's on-going efforts to seek improvements to local governance and land use planning.

One of our concerns, since the incorporation of Sooke almost 12 years ago, has been land use planning along the border between Otter Point and the District of Sooke. This includes protection of the Kemp Lake watershed which supplies water to about 40% of the homes in Otter Point who are on the Kemp Lake Waterworks District system and buffering Otter Point's more rural character from the District's denser development.

In the summer of 2009, a delegation of OPSRRA directors meet with senior staff from the provincial Ministry of Community Development to discuss local governance and land use issue and were directed to work being done by the B.C. Union of Municipalities (UBCM). One of the recommendation from the UBCM was that unincorporated areas, such as Otter Point, that border growing incorporated areas, such as Sooke, consider a Fringe Area Management Agreement (FAMA) to identify concerns and find ways to cooperate to coordinate land use activities along their common border.

The idea of having a FAMA for Otter Point with the District of Sooke was brought to an ad hoc JDFEA Governance Committee meeting organized by Director Hicks in the fall of 2010. Representatives from East Sooke, who were at that meeting, were also interested in joint planning for Sooke Harbour and the Sooke Basin. So a small group of committee members from East Sooke and Otter Point were given the task of drafting the FAMA. At the suggestion of the District of Sooke, this subcommittee reviewed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that the T'Sou-ke First Nation and the District had agreed upon in 2007. The thought of drafting a MOU instead of a FAMA grew from this and resulted in the FAMA being embedded in the MOU.

The MOU recognizes that the District and the Electoral Area have common interests in police, ambulance, recreation, museum, library, transportation, transit and social services that the two may wish to collaborate and coordinate their efforts in providing for and/or financially supporting these services. There are also land use, environmental and economic concerns that cross boundaries. Therefore, what has been agreed to in the MOU, is that both the District and the Electoral Area will appoint representatives to a joint committee to identify areas of cooperation and

information sharing that would mutually enhance the economic, recreational and environmental opportunities in the region. The full text of the MOU will be available on the OPSRRA web site once it is released by the CRD.

7. UPCOMING LOCAL ELECTIONS

Saturday, November 19, 2011 will be municipal, school board and, in some areas, regional director and commissions election day throughout B.C. In Shirley, Jordan River and Otter Point we will be electing candidates to the following positions:

- CRD Regional Director (1 position for the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area)
- JDF Land Use Committee (1 Shirley/Jordan River & 1 Otter Point position)
- Shirley/Jordan River Advisory Planning Commission (5 positions)
- Otter Point Advisory Planning Commission (5 positions)
- Sooke School District #62 (4 positions from the Milne's Landing Zone)

OPSRRA will help publish the names of candidates as their intentions are declared.

8. THE GREAT B.C. SHAKEOUT DRILL

The Great British Columbia ShakeOut drill conducted on January 26 was a great achievement, with more than 470,000 registered participants and very positive province-wide media coverage on the importance of earthquake awareness and emergency preparedness. Although highly successful, the January 26 date (chosen because it was the 311th anniversary of the Great Cascadia earthquake that struck the Pacific Northwest) conflicted with Secondary Schools provincial exams. After consulting with School Districts, the Ministry of Education and through a survey that involved emergency management stakeholders from across the province, determined a new time for future drill campaigns—the third Thursday of each October.

Please reserve **October 20, 2011 at 10:20 am** in your calendars for the next ShakeOut BC Earthquake drill.

BC and Yukon will now join California, Idaho, Nevada, and Guam in conducting a mass earthquake drill at the same time on the same day. Washington, Oregon and potentially New Zealand have all expressed interest in joining the mass drill campaign in 2012.

With the drill only four months away, we have our work cut out for us! The ShakeOut BC website reflects the new date and incorporates many of the lessons learned from our first drill. Commencing July 1, please check the website www.shakeoutbc.ca for information updates, resources, and to register for the upcoming October drill.

Help us to accomplish another successful ShakeOut BC drill and further support public awareness and education of the earthquake threat in BC.

9. CRD DECISION ON THE MARINE TRAIL REZONING

The CRD Board has again postponed making a decision about the rezoning request from Marine Trail Holdings Ltd. regarding their properties west of Jordan River. The issue before the CRD Board has been whether the whole CRD Board or Committee A would be allowed to vote on this rezoning application. At the June 29 meeting of the Board the clock ran out on this agenda item and it was tabled for another two weeks until the Board's July 13 meeting.

10. WHAT WAS COOKING 100 YEARS AGO?

We begin a new feature for the newsletter that will take a look at what local area residents may have been dining upon 100 hundred years ago. Written records of family recipes from this era are next to non-existent. The Sooke Region Museum has nothing in their collection and of course those who lived in the local area 100 years ago are no longer with us—thus the challenge. Cookbooks and household science manuals have been kept by some local families and the B.C. Woman's Institute did a 1858-1958 B.C. Centennial Cookbook to which the Shirley Woman's Institute contributed recipes; this is where we will begin.

Let us know if you have some old recipes, grocery lists or household hints from an earlier era that we can share with others.

Sausage & Apple Hot Sandwich

3/4 pound sausage meat
2 or 3 apples, cored and sliced (with skin on)
buttered toast
bacon curls

Shape sausage meat in rounds 1/2 inch thick. Fry. Take from pan and keep hot. Saute sliced apples in a little sausage fat. Place a sausage patty and a slice of apple on a buttered toast. Garnish with bacon curls.

Original text:

Shape 3/4 lb. of sausage meat in rounds 1/2 inch thick. Fry, take from pan and keep hot. Core and slice 2 or 3 apples, leaving skin on, saute in a little sausage fat. Place a sausage patty and a slice of apple on a buttered toast. Garnish with bacon curls.

Prospector's Bannock Bread

1 tablespoon of shortening
2/3 cup of hot water
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 tablespoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
bag of flour

Melt shortening in the frying pan you will use to bake the bannock.

Dissolve baking soda, sugar, salt, and baking powder (added last) in the hot water. Add the melted shortening.

Make a bowl shaped hole in the top of the flour bag and pour in the liquid mixture, blending quickly and lightly with the hands until enough flour has adhered to make a soft dough.

Spread the dough in the prepared frying pan, cover and bake. Turn when 2/3 done to brown on both sides or use a reflector from an open fire to brown the top while baking.

Eat warm.

Original text:

Melt 1 tablespoon of shortening in the pan to be used for baking the bannock, and add it to 2/3 cup of hot water in which has been dissolved 1/4 teaspoon of baking soda, 1/2 tablespoon sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, lastly.

Make a bowl shaped hole in the top of the flour bag and pour in the liquid mixture, blending quickly and lightly with the hands until enough flour has adhered to make a soft dough. Lift it to the prepared pan and spread and bake in a covered frying pan. Turn when 2/3 done to brown on both sides or use a reflector from an open fire to brown the top while baking. Eat warm.

11. DID YOU KNOW THAT ...

Peggy Willoughby, daughter of well known Jordan River resident, engineer and businessman D.I. Walker was related to Hannah Maynard (1834-1918), the extraordinary pioneering Victoria photographer of the 1890s and early 1900s?

Duncan Irvine (D.I.) Walker was an engineer hired in 1908 to be the superintendent of the Vancouver Island Power Company power project in Jordan River. He went on to be a "power house" himself as a community leader, engineer and businessman and in 1935 built and owned the Jordan River Hotel. In November 1907 he married Katherine Adelaide Maynard (1885-1964) who was either the daughter or grand-daughter of Hannah Maynard. Records of the Maynard family are incomplete and even Hannah Maynard's biographer Claire Weissman Wilks in her book *The Magic Box* couldn't be certain how many children Hannah may have had and what their names were. In marriage, Katherine's identity was overshadowed by her husband's to the point that she was known as Mrs. D.I. even to her friends. One of her mother-in-law's cookbooks, which was passed along to her daughter Peggy, will be used as a source for future recipes from the past for **What was Cooking 100 Years Ago**.
