2. BURNING REGULATIONS FOR SHIRLEY AND OTTER POINT

We have experienced another short but very dry summer followed by an exceptionally dry fall. The local fire departments have posted an **EXTREME** fire hazard warning throughout September and this will likely continue well into October as we'll need several days of heavy rain to reduce the fire rating down to **MEDIUM**. While the **EXTREME** fire hazard warning is in effect there is a complete ban on any open burning, including camp fires, beach fires and garbage incinerators. The usual practice of allowing October burning, with a permit, has been suspended—there are no exceptions!

3. OPSSRA'S MONTHLY SURVEY

September Survey: August 12 Sooke Subaru Triathlon

The **September** survey is now closed; there were 72 participants. We asked questions concerning the August 12 Sooke Subaru Triathlon which required partial and total road closures along sections of Highway 14 west of Gordon's Beach and through the communities of Shirley and Jordan River.

We also invited participants to add any comments and received 50 comments—an amazing response. Comments fell into four categories:

- Great event; worth closing the highway for a short time.
- Emergency services concerns for both community and event participants.
- Not being able to get in or out of the community.
- Disruption to local businesses.

The majority of the comments were not in support of the continued closure of Highway 14. All the comments will be available on the OPSRRA web site: www.opsrra.ca with any identifying information removed to retain anonymity.

OPSRRA will summarize and submit these results to Regional Director Hicks.

Meanwhile, Director Mike Hicks has already made a decision regarding his continuing support for the closure of Highway 14 for the event. On September 15, 2012, he informed the event's sponsor (Saunders Subaru) and event organizers that:

After a great deal of feedback from my constituents and the general public, I am sorry to inform you that I can no longer support the closure of West Coast Road for the Sooke Subaru triathlon. Many reasons such as community safety, inconvenience for travelers and inconvenience for residents were relayed to me and although there is tremendous support for the triathlon, there is none for the closure of Highway 14. Quite simply the Pacific Marine Circle Route has become too busy.

On behalf of the Juan de Fuca residents, I want to sincerely thank you Paul (Regensberg) for organizing this huge event in our region. I am truly sorry to relay this message but I want to tell you early in the game so you may alter your plans well in advance of next season.

Thank you so much Dave and Bob (Saunders) for your support, not only of the event, but your support of our community.

October Survey: Water

It may surprise some, but water doesn't come from a tap!

Think about it; it has to originate somewhere else before it gets to your place. Where that is, how it gets there and whether it will continue to arrive at your tap can make rural living a challenge that separates us from our urban cousins who, of course, get their water from a tap and often don't understand our seasonal preoccupation with water.

So, this has been an unusually dry and difficult couple of months for rural area residents who are not on the Sheringham Estates (Shirley) and Kemp Lake Waterworks (Otter Point) community water systems. The extension of community water and pressurized water hydrants in Otter Point was raised during the recent Otter Point Official Community Plan (OCP) review. It may become a topic for community discussion when the Shirley and Jordan River OCP review takes place next year. Meanwhile, OPSRRA has identified the topic of water as one of its priorities for this year. Three initiatives are presently underway:

1. We organized a preliminary meeting in July with representatives from the Otter Point and Shirley Volunteer Fire Departments, the B.C. Association of Landowners, the Sheringham Estates Water Users and the Kemp Lake Waterworks District to share information and consider collaborating on a water forum.

2. The November 4 Town Hall meeting will have the security of safe drinking water, ground water management and the development of integrated water management between the province and the local area as its theme.
3. Our October on-line survey is about water.

Your participation in the October water survey will help to provide necessary background information about water use and water resources in our community. All responses are anonymous to OPSRRA. The information received will be shared with the organizers of the proposed water forum, the guest speakers at the November Town Hall meeting and the CRD Planning Services staff who are working on our local OCPs.

5. OPSRRA'S NOVEMBER TOWN HALL PUBLIC MEETING

On those occasional years when there aren't any elections, OPSRRA has organizes a Town Hall meeting with our local area elected representatives.

This year's event is Sunday, November 4 from 2:00 to 4:00 pm at the Otter Point Fire Hall.

John Horgan, MLA, and Regional Director Mike Hicks confirmed their attendance. Our MP, Randall Garrison, was invited, but Parliament in Ottawa will be in session at that time and so it is unlikely that he'll be available to attend. However, Mayor Wendal Milne of Sooke has agreed to come—a departure from our previous Town Hall meetings as the unincorporated communities west of Sooke don't participate in Sooke elections. But we do share many services such as the library, RCMP, Highway 14, the Kemp Lake watershed and mutual aid agreements between our fire department with our neighbouring community. Decisions made by Sooke's mayor and council can often affect the JDFEA. Also, the Mayor of Sooke sits on CRD Land Use Committee A which votes on land use recommendations from the JDFEA Land Use Committee to the CRD Board of Directors.

6. BC TRANSIT STATISTICS FOR THE OTTER POINT LOOP

September marked the sixth anniversary of the BC Transit community bus service through Otter Point (Route 63). The Otter Point & Shirley Residents & Ratepayers Association newsletter contacts BC Transit each year to find out how well the service is being used.

The route originates in Sooke and travels west along Otter Point Road to Kemp Lake Road, then down Kemp Lake Road to West Coast Road and back to Sooke. The community bus does two morning and two afternoon loops (Monday to Friday) through Otter Point. There is a second route (Route 66) traveled by the same bus from Sooke to East Sooke. Sun River was added to the East Sooke loop in 2010; no changes are planned for the Otter Point loop.

According to BC Transit, based upon a fall 2010 to fall 2011 passenger count, the community bus carried approximately 8 passengers per trip on the Otter Point loop. This figure was up from an average of 6 passengers per trip in 2009-2010. However the 2011-2012 count shows a decrease to an average of 5 passengers per trip.

One of the frequently mentioned shortcomings with the Otter Point bus service is that it doesn't operate early enough in the morning or late enough in the afternoon to accommodate regular transit users who commute to Victoria. The East Sooke loop provides this service. Both the *Otter Point Official Community Plan Review* and the *Otter Point, Shirley & Jordan River Developing a Strategic Vision Project* identified numerous changes that residents would like to see made to improve local transit service, including:

- Adding a route to Gordon's Beach and eventually to Shirley.
- Adding service in two directions in Otter Point.
- Adding bus pull-off areas at bus stops.
- Extending Handi Dart Service to Shirley.

Jack Hull, who was the General Manager of Integrated Water Services recently retired but was hired, on contract, by the CRD to oversee the CRD sewage upgrade project

And closer to home, **Donna White**, who has been the longest serving member of the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area office, and the Sooke Electoral Area office before that, retired. Donna provided administrative support to a parade of Electoral Area building inspectors over those many years and will be missed.

Lyne Moyes replaced her.

11. DID YOU KNOW THAT ...

Kaulitz Park in Shirley was originally called Sheringham Park but was renamed about 6 years ago after Herman and Annie Kaulitz, who were Shirley pioneers?

The idea to find “more interesting” names for three parks in Shirley originated with the Juan de Fuca Parks & Recreation Commission. Shirley resident Chuck Minton suggested the name Kaulitz Park.

Herman and Annie Kaulitz lived in a cottage on property that was once part of the Milligan Logging Camp. Their place was in the general area across from the present day Eagle Lights Store as you proceed west down the hill on Highway 14 towards Woodhaven Drive.

Herman was a logger and in the 1940s provided Douglas fir and hemlock logs for the Spicer Mill in Shirley. He did his falling north of Point-No-Point and used a truck to get his logs to the mill. He also logged red and yellow cedar which was sent on to Victoria for milling. In the 1950s he operated a small saw mill just east of Point-No-Point that later burned. He ended up cutting timber for the Boon brothers Seaside Sawmill east of Gordon’s Beach in Otter Point and subsequently bought the mill from them in 1952. It operated as the Kaulitz mill until about 1958. The old logging road which Herman Kaulitz used to bring timber from the forests above the Seaside mill down to the mill is still there, but a house was built in the roadway in the 1960s.

Kulitz Park is described in the Juan de Fuca Parks Plan as a 0.68 hectare undeveloped nature park. It is located on the south side of Highway 14 just east of Tieulie Place.
