



Which of the following describes your relationhship with OPSRRA?





How often do you read the newsletter?



If you read the newsletter, what percentage of the newsletter do you read?







3. BC TRANSIT STATISTICS: OTTER POINT LOOP

September marked the eight anniversary of the B.C. Transit community bus service through parts of Otter Point (Route 63). The OPSRRA newsletter contacts B.C. Transit each year to find out how well the service is being used.

The average passenger load per trip on the Otter Point loop:

Community Bus: Bike rack use limited to daylight hours only.

The route begins in Sooke and travels west along Otter Point Road to Kemp Lake Road, then down Kemp Lake Road to West Coast Road and back to Sooke. The community bus does two morning and two afternoon loops (Monday to Friday) through part of Otter Point. There is a second route (Route 66) traveled by the same bus from Sooke to East Sooke. Sun River was added to the East Sooke loop in 2010; no changes are planned for the Otter Point loop.

BC Transit is hosting an Open House in our area on Saturday, October 5, 2013. They're inviting local residents to visit with them and comment on schedules, routes, equipment and more. A special transit bus will be parked at the Sooke Farmers Market site from 10:00 am until Noon.

Property owners in Greater Victoria who have access to bus service in their community pay an annual tax to BC Transit on their property taxes. In Otter Point we are assessed 23.67 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value. For example, a property assessed at \$500,000 in 2013 paid \$123.35 to BC Transit. Shirley and Jordan River don't have bus service in their communities and therefore don't pay this tax.

In the past, our association has lobbied for improvements to local bus service. OPSRRA will be making a submission to BC Transit with the following suggestions we have heard from the membership:

- Operate early enough in the morning or late enough in the afternoon to accommodate regular transit users who commute to Victoria.
- Add a route to Gordon's Beach and eventually to Shirley.
- Add service in two directions in Otter Point.
- Add bus pull-off areas at bus stops.
- Extend Handidart service to Shirley.

4. OPSRRA DIRECTORS MEET WITH JOHN HORGAN, MLA

A delegation of OPSRRA directors met with John Horgan, our MLA, on Friday, September 27, 2013. This meeting has become an annual event and provides both the association and our elected representative and opportunity to exchange points-of-view and identify priorities.

This year's meeting covered the following:

Highway 14 and Local Roads

OPSRRA thanked Mr. Horgan for his support and assistance facilitating the recent upgrades to West Coast Road (Highway 14), Otter Point Road and Kemp Lake Road. The issue of lack of shoulders was also discussed as well as the need for kilometre signage along Highway 14 to help first responders, such as our volunteer fire departments, locate motor vehicle emergencies. Compensation to our volunteer fire departments for attending accidents on Highway 14 remains an ongoing discussion with the province.

BC Water Act

There is a need to map local streams and water courses to protect ground water and individuals with licenses on streams.

Governance

Governance for our area is still a topic of interest. OPSRRA shared the information from the Governance Survey we did in our May, 2013 newsletter.

BC Hydro Outages

OPSRRA expressed the concerns we heard regarding the large number of outages in our area this past year, as well as the responses we have had from BC Hydro on this issue.

5. FIRE SEASON IN OUR AREA

We've come through a very dry summer with many fires in our community. In addition to the fires there were also numerous highway accidents requiring call-outs by the Shirley and Otter Point Fire Departments.

Note: Jordan River does not have a fire department.

Cooler, wet weather has returned and it will soon be okay to resume open burning, with a permit, as of October 1.

The following information is from the Otter Point Fire Department web site: www.otterpointfire.bc.ca. Similar regulations apply to the Shirley Fire Protection District. Contact your local fire department for more details.

Fire Season is April 1 to October 31

The season may be extended at the discretion of the Fire Chief. Class 'A' and Class 'B' fires require a permit from the fire department. See below for definitions of Class 'A' and 'B' fires. For Otter Point call 250-642-6211 and for Shirley call 250-646-2107. As these are volunteer departments, please leave a message and the person issuing permits will call you back.

Prohibited Materials: The following shall NOT be burnt: tires, plastic, drywall, paint and paint products, treated lumber, asphalt, asphalt products, rubber, fuel, solvents, metals and lubricant containers, tar paper, railway ties, demolition waste, garbage, biomedical waste or manure as well as other material that may be listed under the BC Ministry of Environment Open Burning Smoke Control Regulation.

Class A Fires

Between October 1 and June 30: burn ok—permits required

Between July 1 and September 30, NO burning at all

Burning of any piles larger than 2 metres in diameter and 1 metre in height requires a permit from the fire department. No person shall burn land clearing waste:

- within 50 metres of buildings on the same property
- within 50 metres of the works or facilities of any utility
- within 100 metres of a neighbouring residence or business
- between a building and a highway
- for more than 3 consecutive days
- No person shall add additional materials to a fire within 2 hours of sunset of each day of the fire

Class B Fires

Between April 1 and June 30: burn ok—permits required

Between July 1 and September 30, NO burning at all

Between October 1 and October 31: burn ok—permits required

Between November 1 and April 1: burn ok—no permits required

Class B limits on hand pile burning shall be maximum diameter of 2 metres or 6 feet and a maximum height of 1 metre or 3 feet. No green debris or leaves shall be burnt except by specific exemptions which may be at the discretion of the Fire Chief. No person shall add additional materials to a fire within 2 hours of sunset of each day of the fire.

FIRE EMERGENCY IN SHIRLEY OR OTTER POINT, CALL 911

6. NO HUNTING OR SHOOTING BOUNDARY IN SHIRLEY, JORDAN RIVER AND OTTER POINT

September was the beginning of that season of the year when we hear gunfire in the neighbourhood. Some of it is from legally licensed hunting; some is not. The province, through the Fish & Wildlife Branch of the Ministry of the Environment, issues hunting licenses, determines hunting areas and regulates hunters. If you go to Map A5 on page 30 of the following link, you will see our local area No Shooting and No Hunting boundary:

The boundary is generally described as north of the B.C. Hydro power line (which runs from Jordan River through Shirley and Otter Point) except between Muir Creek and DeMamiel Creek in Otter Point where the boundary is an additional 800 metres north of the power line. The extended area in Otter Point came about in 2007 following a request from OPSRRA made in response to complaints from some residents living north of the power line who were in an area where guns were being legally discharged. OPSRRA arranged for the local Conservation Officer to attend our 2007 Annual General Meeting, and based upon comments received, he recommended that the boundary be moved further north of the power line in the Tugwell, Robinson and East Glen neighbourhoods.

The RCMP shares responsibility for monitoring the discharge of firearms inside of the No Shooting and No Hunting boundary. According to S/Sgt. Wright of the Sooke RCMP detachment, any incidents concerning the discharge of firearms, regardless of time of day or night, or where they occur, are investigated by the RCMP. Allegations of illegal hunting are investigated by the provincial Conservation Service.

7. ART SPACE AND GALLERY AT MALAHAT FARM

8. REZONING RECOMMENDED FOR SCOUTS CANADA, CAMP BARNARD

A public hearing was held on September 21, 2013 to hear final public comment on whether Camp Barnard, the Scouts Canada property in Otter Point, should be rezoned. No one spoke at the public hearing, so the recommendation to rezone will now go forward to the CRD Board of Directors for approval.

The Camp Barnard property was assembled over time and presently consists of parcels with different zoning. The new rezoning will consolidate the Camp's multiple zones into one new zone called Community Facility Camp Barnard and will ensure that any future subdivision of the property couldn't happen without community comment.

Scouts Canada and Camp Barnard have a 68 year history in our community beginning with the donation of two parcels of land on Young's Lake in February, 1945, by Senator George Barnard. Further purchases of adjacent land in 1971 and 1974 brought their total property ownership to 251 acres.

Camp Barnard is open year round and provides recreational, life skills, leadership and wilderness experiences to Scouts and other youth-serving organizations in the Greater Victoria Area. In 2012 they hosted 12,000 camper nights plus additional day use activities including the Otter Point Firefighters Association's annual Children's' Halloween party. They are planning to host a Provincial Jamboree in 2015.

9. CHANGE COMING FOR THE COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATION OF SERVING AGENCIES (CASA)

The following is based upon a news release from the Sooke Family Centre.

The child and family services organization we know as CASA is undergoing a change. The Cooperative Association of Serving Agencies (CASA) has its home in the Sooke Child, Youth and Family Centre building at 2145 Townsend Road in Sooke, which is owned by

the Children's Health Foundation of Vancouver Island. The Boards of CASA and the Steering Committee of the Sooke Region Community Health Initiative (CHI) are working towards merging their two organizations. So far the rules for a unified cooperative have been updated and submitted to the Registrar of Registered Cooperatives and a new CASA Board has been elected. Members of the two organizations meet monthly to advance the merger, discuss topics related to the health of the community and review new opportunities. Current projects include the Age Friendly grant and the Volunteer Bureau. Later this month, look for the re-designed and updated Sooke Region Resource Inventory with added features and information.

The Child, Youth and Family Centre remains as a place for individuals and families from the Sooke Region to come for services such as:

- The Vancouver Island Health Authority's (VIHA) public health services
- Counselling
- Drop-in groups
- Prenatal services
- Pre-school
- Community outreach
- Clothing exchange
- Therapeutic services

10. JDFEA ADMIN SERVICES BUILDING GOES SOLAR


Construction continues on the JDFEA Admin Services Building in the business park at 3220 Otter Point Road. The roof is complete, siding is going on and the interior is being worked on. The completion date is scheduled for December 1, 2013 with occupancy completed by December 31, 2013.

Juan de Fuca Electoral Area Regional Director Mike Hicks has informed the OPSRRA newsletter that he would like to see the addition of solar panels to reduce the building's use of electricity.

According to Director Hicks,

"We are intending to mount 40 solar panels on our South West facing roof which will provide clean AC power directly to our 600 amp service provided by B.C. Hydro. Each panel will provide 250 watts of power for a total of 10 KW. The system is estimated to provide 10,000 Kilowatts of power each year. The average Canadian residence uses 11,000 Kw per year. Depending on our heat-pump's consumption (heat), we estimate a minimum 50% reduction of reliance on B.C. Hydro.

The system will not include back-up batteries (for the cost and space). I will be asking the CRD Board on October 9 to access up to \$50,000 from our Gas Tax to pay for this project. It will cost somewhere between \$32,000 and \$50,000. Also, we will be wiring a panel for a back-up generator. When and if we can afford a generator, it will run just about everything except heat. At the end of the day, we should be fairly self-sufficient in case of a prolonged emergency situation."

11. TIMBERWEST PROPOSES A WIND FARM IN OUR AREA

On September 26, 2013, TimberWest Forest Corporation announced its intention to develop, build and operate large scale wind energy projects on their private forest lands on Vancouver Island including properties in the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area Rural Resource Lands (RRL) north of Shirley and Otter Point. This undertaking is being done in partnership with EDP Renewables Canada. They have also signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the T'Sou-ke First Nation that respects that some of the proposed wind farms would be on traditional T'Sou-ke First Nation territory. This MOU may eventually develop into a formal partnership.

Before this announcement, Timber West had already received support from the Juan de Fuca Land Use Committee and approval from the Capital Regional District (CRD) Board of Directors for temporary permits allowing the erection of test wind towers at selected sites on their property in the RRL. This new proposal goes beyond the earlier application for test sights and would likely require rezoning of their proposed wind farm sites.

Note: A recent change in the rezoning process for properties in the RRL requires that, if recommended, the application must go to the full CRD board for discussion and a vote.

12. JDFEA REGIONAL DIRECTOR RESIGNS FROM WESTSHORE PARKS & RECREATION SOCIETY

Several weeks ago Juan de Fuca Electoral Area Regional Director Mike Hicks announced that:

"Regretfully I must resign from the West Shore Parks & Recreation Society (WSPRS) Board of Directors. I have been advised that I am in conflict of interest and until the Provincial Government changes their ruling, I will be unable to sit on the society board and also approve my many budgets in the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area. I have been hoping for over a year to appoint a constituent, Darren Wright from the Malahat to sit in my place and hope that the owner's group will meet in the future to enable this change. Until then I have the utmost of confidence that you will take care of my Malahat interests."

On September 23, 2013 Director Hicks also resigned from CREST.

As reported in the April issue of the OPSRRA newsletter, this dilemma came about as the result of a provincial decision following a January 2013 ruling by the BC Court of Appeal. In its decision, the Court determined there is a conflict of interest when a Regional Director is also a director of a non-profit society receiving funding from a regional district.

Director Hicks is required, by virtue of his elected status, to sit on the Board of Directors for the West Shore Parks & Recreation Society, which provides recreation services to residents of the Malahat and C.R.E.S.T., the CRD's emergency communications organization. Both are non-profit organizations funded (in part) by taxpayers of the JDFEA and a portion of their budget is "bundled" with 63 other JDFEA budget categories such as our fire departments, recreation services and land use planning. According to the Court's ruling, this presents a conflict of interest, making Director Hicks ineligible to vote at the CRD Board on anything pertaining to the JDFEA budget.

As well, other legislation apparently prevents the budgets of the two non-profits being voted on separately from the remainder of the JDFEA budget items and also prevents the Alternate Regional Director from voting in place of the Regional Director.

13. SHIRLEY HILL BOOGIES #2: FALL VIOLIN CONCERT

Nick Wilde, who has helped organized the return of the Shirley Boogies, submitted the following.

On the last Sunday of September the Shirley Hill Boogies had a second boogie at the Shirley Hall; a solo concert/CD release party with the amazing violinist Tyler Carson. It was quite popular amongst Shirleyites (Shirley Delicious sold out all the tickets that they had) with approximately 7% of Shirley's (full time) population in attendance! A great time was had by all and many have stated that they are looking forward to the next time Tyler Carson graces us with his unique violin playing (which will probably be sometime late this fall or early this winter).

14. DID YOU KNOW THAT ...

As early as 1907 railways were used in our area to help move logs from the forest? The most commonly used locomotives were the Baldwin, Shay and Climax. The restored Climax locomotive pictured below operated in the Cowichan Valley between 1911 and 1927 and is currently on display at the Forest Museum in Duncan.

Climax locomotives operated in our area from 1907 until the late 1920s. The Jordan River Lumber Company began using one in November, 1907, and by 1909 had 2 locomotives, 7 miles of track and 10 railway trucks to haul their logs to tidewater. Otter Point saw its first Climax engine in early 1907. The Sylvania Logging Company used it to haul their timber out of the DeMamiel Stream Valley and by 1917 they had 8 miles of track in that area. In 1925, the Canadian Puget Sound Lumber and Timber Company moved their logging operation from Jordan River to Point No Point in Shirley and took along their Climax. It was towed ashore from a barge by a steam donkey and used to move quarried rock to build a breakwater for their logging operation.

The Climax and other geared locomotives were designed for work in the mining and logging industries where rough terrain, steeper grades, poor quality track and rail beds often limited them to operating at slow speeds. Unlike a conventional steam piston engine which has direct drive to the wheels, a geared engine

transferred energy from the steam boiler(s) through a gear box. This adaption gave them greater starting strength and thus more suitable for pulling heavy loads. One distinctive characteristic of the Climax was the driving piston which, unlike other locomotives, is set at an angle instead of horizontal to the wheels.

Climax locomotives were built between 1888 and 1928 by the Climax Manufacturing Company of Corry Pennsylvania and the company had an agency in Seattle to sell and maintain their engines on the West Coast. There were 1,100 built and only a dozen or are known to still exist.
